or more than 40 years, Alan M. Weinstock has been a leader and innovator in the field of mental health and human services. **An Illustrious Career** 

Feig, former Executive Deputy Commissioner of the New York State Office of Mental Health (NYSOMH) and Deputy Commissioner for Administration of the New York State Office for People with Developmental Disabilities, highlighted Alan's illustrious career. Weinstock began as a teacher in the Adolescent Unit at Pilgrim State Psychiatric Center. During his 30+ year tenure with NYSOMH Alan served as Executive Director of Creedmoor Psychiatric Center, Kings Park Psychiatric Center, Central Islip Psychiatric Center and Pilgrim State Psychiatric Center and has been widely credited with turning around and improving the performance of each of those institutions. He has also served as NYSOMH's Executive Deputy Commissioner.

## Since 2011, Alan has also been instrumental in fueling the sponsorship and eventual merger of PSCH and the Pederson-Krag Center.

This sponsorship expanded PSCH's reach to Long Island and brought us Family and Children's services along with Addiction Recovery services, including substance

abuse, prevention and treatment programs. This merger resulted in a new name and rebranding of the organizations — WellLife Network. Under Alan's leadership, WellLife Network's budget grew from \$230,000 in 1980 to \$90 million in 2010. With solid financial underpinnings, responsible management,
